Planning a successful HLF funded project



Our Heritage Grants of £10,000 - £100,000

- Open programme
- Projects up to 3 years long
- No application deadline
- Decision in 8 -10 weeks



Heritage Grants Grants over £100,000

- Open programme
- Projects up to 5 years long
- 2 rounds
- 4 deadlines a year for applications up to £2 million
- Decision in 3 months



Costs you can include

- New staff
- Professional fees
- Recruitment
- Repair + conservation
- Digital outputs
- Equipment and materials
- Training for staff
- Training for volunteers
- Expenses for volunteers
- Publicity and promotion
- Evaluation (no more than 3% of total grant request)
- Full Cost Recovery
- Contingency

Case studies



- Restoring & repairing Providence Chapel Heritage Grant: £463,200 HLF grant – 83%
- Rescue Providence Chapel (Grade II*) & remove it from the Heritage at Risk register
- Engage people with its history and secure its future through community volunteering and a partnership with the local primary school
- The chapel will be restored and fitted out for community and educational use

Pugin & Augustine education & visitor centre RC Southwark diocese - £909,300 HLF grant – 73%





- Project aims to provide a wider range of activities and encourage a wider and new audience of people to visit, and re-visit, the building and engage with the twin themes of Pugin and St Augustine
- Identified target audiences:
 - Religion
 - Heritage & Pugin enthusiasm
 - Education
 - Tourism
 - Local families



Approved purposes – Pugin & Augustine education & visitor centre

- Restoration of Chancel and Lady Chapel to Pugin's original design.
- Provision of improved facilities including toilets and kitchenette, accessible toilet and installation of new adaptable lighting and controls.
- Improve physical access.
- Establishment of a research centre.
- Adaptation of the school room as a visitor welcome area .
- Provision of interpretation including audio-guides, visitor route signage, films, tablet interactives focusing on collections, trails for children and families.
- Deliver a volunteer induction and training programme with opportunities provided in archival work, visitor welcome, shop and centre operation, guiding and preventative conservation cleaning.
- Delivery of activities as set out in the activity plan. Examples include lectures, specialist events, joint open days with The Grange, concerts, exhibitions and events specific to Pugin week and St Augustine's week.
- Implementation of recommendations in the business plan and working towards sustainable operation of the site.
